Palomar Observatory, located atop Palomar Mountain in north San Diego County, California, is a center of astronomical research owned and operated by the [California Institute of Technology](#) (Caltech).

The Observatory is home to three [active research telescopes](#): the [200-inch \(5.1-meter\) Hale Telescope](#), the [48-inch \(1.2-meter\) Samuel Oschin Telescope](#), and the [60-inch \(1.5-meter\) telescope](#)

Research at Palomar Observatory is pursued by a [broad community of astronomers](#) from Caltech and other domestic and international partner institutions.


Just so everyone knows, Rick's ankle is okay and he's up and at 'em again.

My sister had a check engine light on in her car so Rick showed me how to hook up an OBD II Code Reader to the port on her car and get the code for the issue she was having with it.

I found out she was having trouble with the coolant temperature sensor in the car. That's great to know, but how are you supposed to know where this thing is and how to get to it?

My sister has a generic, do it yourself repair manual for her Hyundai so we took a look at it to see if we could figure out where this bad boy was. Yikes, there's no way you would be able to find out exactly where this thing is situated using the book!

Luckily, Rick knows a little bit about my sister's car and others having worked on many in his lifetime. He replaced her radiator last year.

Rick showed me where the part was AFTER removing a whole slew of things, like the shield over the engine, the air cleaner assembly, radiator hoses, and on and on! Plus, before we removed the sensor, we had to find the stop cock for the radiator so we could remove some of the coolant. You had to remove things to get to that too! They don't make it easy for us!

Once he cleared the way, he put the socket wrench on the sensor and told me to have a go at removing it. It was a lot harder than I thought it would be! I was afraid of breaking something so I let Rick get it loose and then we finished it up.

My sister is back on the road and I learned a little something new. Nothing wrong with that!
